Club Name Change Approved

Bohemian Wireharied Pointing Griffon Club of America to become Cesky Fousek North America

September 23, 2019 - BWPGCA Secretary Robin Strathy declared the 30-day voting period on the BWPGCA name change, to Cesky Fousek North America (CFNA), to be complete. At the time the vote was called, 97% of the votes were in favor of changing the name. There were ninety-two total votes, 89 in favor and 3 against. The Club's Constitution requires that the proposal pass by 2/3 of those voting.

With the voting complete, it's time for the Club to begin the process of effecting the change. This includes such details as revising the Club's logo, contracts, forms and our digital presence. There will also be changes to the corporate registration, the IRS and insurance coverage. The Board of Directors has set a target date of the January 1, 2020 to have all the changes complete.

Along with the name change comes another significant accomplishment, recognition of our dogs by one of the world's major kennel clubs, the Federation Cynologique Internationale (FCI) through its North American representative club, The Federacion Canofila de Puerto Rico (FCPR). Since FCI and most of the dog-world recognizes the breed Cesky Fousek, but not Bohemian Wirehaired Pointing Griffon, several of our dogs and most of the recent litters have been registered with FCI.

BWPGCA President Jim Crouse said "First, I would like to recognize, Laurie Connell for her tenacity in pursuing this name change for many years. This is a new beginning for this Club and the dogs it supports. I'm excited that our dogs are finally recognized by the FCPR and that we now have registered dogs, not just designer dogs. We haven't had the option of registration with a national or international kennel club since the 1980's when the Club started outcrossing with the Cesky Fouseks.

There's a lot of work ahead, but I believe our dedicated members will rise to the occasion."

Report from the Breeding Committee by Laurie Connell

The 2019 breeding season is now over, and we are starting our process for 2020.

After a rocky start we ended up with five wonderful litters, full of potential as future hunters and family companions.

They are:

"B" of Bald Eagle (Cira od Aliny z Nehvizd x Edý z Veseckých luhů) born 06 April 2019 2 males 3 females.

"A" of Cherry River (Calina Rokycanská kotlina x Oliver z Malého Boubína) born 13 April 2019 2 males 4 females

"A" of Shaw Brook (Alma z Březové hráze x Brady of Blackberry Briar) born 02 may 2019 7 males 3 females

"B" of Two River's Crossing (Arika of Zumbro Valley x Argo ze Stoprounských vinic)

born 23 May 20192 males 5 females

"A" of Payette River (Cora z Cecemínských vinic x Corbet of High Desert) born 29 May 20192 males 4 females

As always, we based the number of breedings on the length of the puppy list. We were able to place all the puppies in good homes; however, we ran into difficulties because 16 people on the active puppy list decided at the last minute to defer until 2020. We are exploring a system to help relieve us of this uncertainty in future breedings.

This year, we are now able to register litters in the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) through the Puerto Rico Kennel club (FCPR). Dogs registered in the FCPR may compete in NAVHDA and UKC, unlike our domestically bred dogs. The breeding rights are still held through the breeders/ buyers agreement each owner signs before they get their puppy. However, BOTH parents must be registered before the litter registration can be submitted and EVERY puppy must have a microchip number for litter registration. Also, the price per puppy for registration increases as the age of the puppy increases with up to 6 months of age as the limit that the club will pay for litter registration. Thus far, three of our litters have had litter registration submitted. They are "B" of Bald Eagle, "A" of Cherry River, and "A" of Payette River. For the other two litters, if owners want to participate in any out of club activities, they will need to go through the longer process of single dog registration. Those folks should contact the registrar (Laurie Connell) for help through the process.

This year all of the breeders embraced the Puppy Culture methods with videos and a workbook. We have already gotten a number of responses from new puppy owners telling us how these puppies are very well prepared for their new homes. It is the responsibility of the new owners to follow through with all the tremendously hard work

the breeders have done! In addition, we have initiated a new Training Committee (TC). The TC is still in development, but we hope that that will shift some of the responsibility of mentoring new puppy owners from the breeders to the TC. The next several years will show even more developments along these lines and we have hopes it will give assistance to new owners, especially for the early weeks getting their puppy to be good family members and canine citizens.

Editor's Note

Laurie mentioned the great job that breeders did with employing the Puppy Culture model to raising their litters. They also did a great job with documenting their experiences in photographs and videos. Two of the breeders, A of Shaw Brook and B of Two River's Crossing, created Facebook pages for their litters. It's a great way to share the litter's progress on Facebook without mixing the content with one's personal page.

The pride and excitement overwhelmed me. The grouse will be mounted to celebrate his success.
